# Easter and Enchantment A Reflection by Reverend Larry Wright

#### Have you read The Secret Garden?

Frances Hodgson Burnett's novel, remains one of the classics of children's literature. A story of a child finding hope and healing through nature and the lessons nature teaches about life. It's also a story of enchantment. Mary, the central character is drawn to a vision of something enticing, seemingly just out of reach yet visible in the distance though unobtainable. Through perseverance she enters The Secret Garden.

Gardens feature in the epic Bible stories of human progress under God. The garden of Eden symbolises the ideal relationship between humanity, creation and the creator. The garden of Gethsemane (where Jesus prayed before his arrest, torture and execution) symbolises the apparent futility of faith in the face of cruel oppression and injustice. The Easter garden symbolises the triumph of Justice, Life and Love over the forces of death and destruction.

To live and engage with the promise of 'Life in all its abundance', is to intuitively understand we will encounter all three experiences represented by these "gardens" in our lives. The best children's stories help with the pressure of developing emotionally. Working with children we often experience something of their more entrancing perspectives on the world. Maybe, there is someone in the BDMAT network with an idea for a children's novel about life in the pandemic?

When pupils and staff returned to school we were still in a period of uncertainty and anxiety. As Easter approaches the promises of life returning to 'normal' seems just around the corner, visible but not yet obtainable, just like Mary's partial vision of her secret garden. The hope engendered by even a partial vision may offer; new life, promise and abundance, a compelling force for good.

According to St John's Gospel chapter 20, another Mary encounters Jesus in a garden in a new way after his death. She doesn't recognise him at first. She has lost hope and is in despair. Jesus represented all she and hoped for in life and he's dead to her or so she thought. Yet, something happened which caused her to reimagine the boundaries between life and death. Death was not the end for Jesus or his message. The garden flourished. A strange new thing happened.

One of the more enchanting quotes from The Secret Garden regarding belief and faith may have been written with Easter in mind.

"At first people refuse to believe that a strange new thing can be done, then they begin to hope it can be done, then they see it can be done--then it is done and all the world wonders why it was not done centuries ago."

# Christ Church, Church of England Secondary Academy – Update March 2021





This is a very exciting time for our new school as we look forward to welcoming families to our school community in September. We have been humbled by the very high level of interest in our school and places in our founding cohort.

# Lateral flow tests for parents

The government is recommending that households with primary aged children carry out a COVID-19 lateral flow test twice per week. Unfortunately, the government is not issuing these to schools to distribute to parents.

There are different ways to get a test for members of households, childcare and support bubbles in England who do not have symptoms of coronavirus.

#### Members of households, childcare or support bubbles

From 1 March 2021, if you're a member of a household, childcare bubble or support bubble of a pupil you can get a twice-weekly test:

- · through your employer if they offer testing to employees
- at a local test site
- · by collecting a home test kit from a test site
- by ordering a home test kit online

#### **Collect test kits**

You can collect 2 packs of home test kits at a local collection point. Each pack contains 7 tests. Anyone 18 or over can collect.

Most collection points are open from 1.30pm to 7pm. You can check online if the location is open or busy before you go. You do not need to make an appointment.

Find your nearest home test kit collection point.

#### Order home test kits online

If you cannot get tested at your workplace, or are unable to go to a test site or collect test kits, you can order a home test kit online.

Do not order online if you can get a test through other methods; this frees up home delivery for those who need it most.

Order rapid lateral flow home test kits

What twice-weekly testing involves

You will be asked to:

- take a test twice a week (every 3 or 4 days apart)
- report every result to NHS Test and Trace on the same day you take the test

Report your test result online or by calling 119.

If anyone tests positive or gets coronavirus symptoms, they should tell the school and:

- · self-isolate immediately
- get a PCR test to confirm the result
- follow the stay at home guidance for households with possible coronavirus infection


A negative result means the test did not find signs of coronavirus. But this does not guarantee you do not have coronavirus, so you should keep following all coronavirus advice including:

- regular handwashing
- social distancing
- wearing a face covering where recommended

Thank you for following this guidance and in doing so protecting our pupils, families and staff.

## More school news!


#### **Nonsuch Primary School**


#### **Woodside CE Primary School**
